She also worked for the American Cancer Society and now practices Massage Therapy, focusing on oncology patients at a private facility. Robert D. Buck, Sr. attended community college before becoming an IBM executive, managing government software contracts in multiple regions, including the South Pacific. After retirement he pursued restoring homes, dealing antiques, creating oriental rugs, and basketmaking. He developed a special interest in replicating Shenandoah Valley cabinet maker, Johannes Spitler's early 1800s designs. Graduating valedictorian of her police academy, she became one of the first women officers in Lancaster County, PA, where she was born and raised. Anya Kirshbaum is a bi/queer poet and somatic therapist living in Seattle, Washington. Her work has appeared or is forthcoming in Swamp Pink, Mississippi Review, Whale Road Review, Crannóg, Solstice Literary Magazine, and elsewhere. She was a finalist for the Orison Spiritual Literature Prize and the Patricia Dobler Poetry Award, was nominated for a 2024 Forward Prize, and was the recipient of the 2023 Banyan Poetry Prize. Octavio Quintanilla is the 2025 Texas Poet Laureate and the author of the poetry collections, *If I Go Missing* (Slough Press, 2014), *The Book of Wounded Sparrows* (Texas Review Press, 2024), which was longlisted for the National Book Award, and *Las Horas Imposibles / The Impossible Hours*, winner of the 2024 Ambroggio Prize of the Academy of American Poets (University of Arizona Press, 2025). His Frontextos (visual poems) have been published and exhibited widely, including in the Mexican Cultural Institute in San Antonio. He is the founder and director of the literature & arts festival, VersoFrontera, publisher of Alabrava Press, and former Poet Laureate of San Antonio, TX. Octavio is also the recipient of the Nebrija Creadores Scholarship which allowed him a month-long residency at the Instituto Franklin at Alcalá University in Alcalá de Henares, Spain.
